Over the past 20 years, Midtown has experienced substantial changes. You have been an important part of our journey, as the Midtown Management District (MMD) Board of Directors and staff have consistently relied on the community to provide feedback and ideas as well as actively participate in building one of Houston's most successful communities.

As we move forward into another decade of change, it is worth acknowledging and taking in the enormity of success achieved to date.

In 2000 when this urban experiment began, there were only 365 homesteaded properties, and the certified-assessed value for the area was \$420 million. The community was absent of miles of sidewalks, trees, lighting, and residents. Today, you can see and feel its transformation. There are now 1,322 homesteaded properties in Midtown, and the uncertified-assessed value is \$2.8 billion. Statistics tell an amazing story that visionary founder, the late F. Charles LeBlanc, would be proud of, but Midtown is more than statistics. It is a collective of people who come together every day to build a community that is inclusive and thoughtful in its evolution.

### Your voice is important.

The day-to-day operations of this community's initiatives are all part of a bigger vision known as the 10-Year Service and Improvement Plan and Assessment Plan. These Plans work in tandem to guide the district's goals, objectives, and programs. Midtown meets with the community monthly to address the five committee areas that are funded by the Service and Improvement Plan, which are service and maintenance, cultural arts, marketing and economic development, public safety, and urban planning. Once every decade, Midtown makes a concerted effort to hold additional meetings, surveys, and focus groups to build a new Service and Improvement Plan that reflects potential new projects and programs. Midtown's current Plan (2015-2024), built with input from the community and approved by the Board of Directors in October 2014, is available at midtownhouston.com.

As we plan for the future, we will ask you to consider various aspects such as services, programs and improvements, public safety, urban planning, cultural arts and entertainment, and economic development. Above all, we are striving to create an outstanding place to live, work, and play.

# DISTRICT JOINS FORCES WITH THE HOUSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT TO PROVIDE MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT TO UNHOUSED INDIVIDUALS

Houston as the fourth-largest city in the U.S. continues to be recognized and lauded nationally for its measurable progress on reducing homelessness. In the past decade, the region has placed more than 25,000 homeless people directly into apartments and houses, according to a New York Times report. Here in Midtown, the district is also making strides to aid in housing the homeless population by partnering with organizations like SEARCH Homeless Services and the Houston Police Department's (HPD) Homeless Outreach Team, which was co-founded in 2011 by Jaime Giraldo, retired officer, and now Public Safety Coordinator for the Midtown Management District.

Since January, Midtown has been partnering with HPD's specialized task force on a pilot program to engage those who are severely mentally ill and experiencing homelessness. These task force agents are trained in community outreach, mental health, addiction, and finding solutions as part of HPD's Mental Health Division. They also work closely with the Harris Center for Mental Health and Intellectual/ Developmental Disability.

"Everyone provides a piece of the puzzle, and it works. It is cost-effective and more favorable than incarceration. The Board of Directors believes it is the right thing to do," expressed Giraldo. "Midtown's approach of outreach combined with enforcement is unique. We're excited to continue testing and learning from the program."





## NEW BALDWIN PARK PLAYGROUND STIMULATES YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

It's summer, and the kids are out of school and likely spending too much time indoors playing video games and scrolling on social media. So, what is a parent to do? Midtown recommends packing a picnic, getting outdoors, and making plans to visit one of the thriving nearby greenspaces like the historic Elizabeth Baldwin Park. Now reopened to the public, the all-new playground equipment helps keep children occupied for hours and provides an inclusive, holistic play experience.

Compared to the park's previous playground, the new play experiences provide a 250% increase in physical and sensory development opportunities and expand play areas for cognitive, social, and language skills development by 300%, 180%, and 11%, respectively.

"We desired to create an environment where children can learn and grow outside of the home and school, so we used feedback received from a community survey to select play structures that encourage creativity and imagination for a broader age range of children," said Midtown Redevelopment Authority (MRA) Director of Engineering and Construction Marlon Marshall. "The bright colors, different textures, and sounds help develop the mind. The swings, slides, and climbing pieces stimulate the body. It all combines to increase the value of play by providing opportunities for the development of social, emotional, physical, and mental skills."

MRA took great care to ensure children of all ages and abilities would be able to use the park. New surfaces make it easier for individuals with disabilities to get around, while a sensory wall and ADA-compliant rocker allow for inclusivity and diversity of play opportunities.

The new playground is part of a strategic \$500,000 investment in improvements at the 4.8-acre park, funded in part by the Midtown Management District. The design team preserved the original fountain, one of the oldest in the city, and the stately oak trees planted in 1905 when the city of Houston built the park. The trees inspired the playground's design and colors selected for its rubber surface protection cushion. The project also includes new and restored lighting around the perimeter of the park to prioritize safety for visitors.

### AFFORDABLE HOUSING CONSTRUCTION TAKES OFF IN HOUSTON'S GREATER THIRD WARD

**New affordable rooftops** are popping up all over Houston's Greater Third Ward and the OST/South Union area as the Midtown Redevelopment Authority/Center for Civic and Public Policy Improvement MRA/CCPPI affordable housing program expands and accelerates. As of the end of June, 12 builders had projects completed, underway, or planned for the near future.

Program participants include CR Design Build, Houston Habitat for Humanity, LIN Development, Park Street Homes, and Titanium Builders LLC. They join Agapè Homes, Cole Klein Builders, HBDi, HouProperties, Mayberry Homes, and ReWard Third Ward, all of which have been part of the MRA/CCPPI initiative for many years. Additionally, earlier this year, the MRA/CCPPI announced their partnership with Boynton Chapel Methodist Church to keep affordable housing a priority for their congregants and the surrounding communities.

### Nearly 80 new homes

Here is what each builder is working on right now: Agapè Homes has four lots slated for development.

- Cole Klein Builders is working on six new homes.
- CR Design Build has three lots secured for construction.
- **HBDi** recently sold three homes and has two more on the market.
- Houston Habitat for Humanity will soon break ground on two homes.
- LIN Development Group is about to start work on two lots.
- Mayberry Homes is working on 45 new homes, most of which are part of the Southern Palm subdivision.
- Park Street Homes are constructing ten new homes.
- Titanium Builders has one home under construction.

Together, these projects total nearly 80 new affordable homes available now or in the months to come for qualifying homebuyers in the Greater Third Ward. The homes currently under construction are in addition to hundreds of single-family homes and rental units that have already been built.



### The Goals

The MRA/CCPPI affordable housing program aims to create affordable housing options that will preserve neighborhoods by allowing residents to stay where they grew up and build generational wealth. MRA provides the land to the builders for free or at a dramatically reduced cost, and the city subsidizes some of the infrastructure costs, allowing the builders to deliver an affordable price point with market-rate amenities.

There is a constant flow of potential buyers for these homes from qualifying individuals and families who might not otherwise be able to afford homeownership. The homes are available to buyers with a median household income below 120% of the area median income who complete the homebuyer education course offered by the Houston Area Urban League. Buyers must use the home as their primary residence for at least 20 years. If the owner does not live there for at least 20 years, there is a requirement to repay a portion of the land cost.

# MIDTOWN TAPS ILLUSTRATOR AND CREATIVE DESIGNER CHRIS ROBINSON TO PRODUCE JUNETEENTH MURAL HONORING HOUSTON'S HISTORICALLY BLACK NEIGHBORHOODS

#### Juneteenth represents a deeply significant moment in American history, especially here in Texas.

On June 19, 1865 Union troops arrived in Galveston and announced the more than 250,000 then enslaved Black people in the state were now free, thereby marking the official end to slavery across the nation, despite the Emancipation Proclamation becoming effective in 1863, followed by the 13th Amendment.

Acknowledging that Midtown Houston was once part of the historic Third Ward and Fourth Ward communities, the Midtown Cultural Arts and Entertainment District was invited to join the citywide Juneteenth celebration led by the Third Ward Cultural Arts District and the Emancipation Park Conservancy.

In honor of this invitation and the newly designated federal holiday, Midtown hosted an open call and invited artists to submit their design ideas for a mural inspired by Houston's historically Black neighborhoods for public display at Bagby Park located at 415 Gray St, Houston, TX 77002.

Local illustrator and creative designer Chris Robinson was selected among the applicants and commissioned for the project. His original artwork titled "Juneteenth Houston" highlights the neighborhoods and their positive impact on Houston's dynamic and distinct culture.


